#### Grantee Health 2021 - 2022

Grantee Health – 95% of children received physical exam -184 of 194 children

0% of children needed medical treatment – 0 children

0% children received medical treatment – 0 children

Grantee Oral Health - 88% of children received dental exam -170 of 194 children

7% of children needed dental treatment-12 of 170 children

50% of children who needed treatment received dental treatment-6 of 12 children

#### **Grantee Kindergarten Preparation and Transition**

- 1. Collaborating with local LEAs to ensure Head Start children have a smooth transition to the public school system.
- 2. Local Kindergarten teachers visit the Head Start centers and discuss expectations and developmentally appropriate areas of focus in the Head Start classroom.
- 3. Head Start children visit kindergarten classrooms in the spring.
- 4. Families of kindergarten eligible children receive transition packets with valuable information to assist with kindergarten transition.
- 5. The Advisory Committee meets 2 times per year to share ideas.
- 6. Child Portfolios are given to families to share with kindergarten teacher, if requested.
- 7. Classroom lesson plans contain transition activities.

### **Grantee Family Support/Parent Involvement**

- \*All Head Start families can participate in monthly Parent Committee meetings that include receiving program and community information, program planning, classroom and health information, and participation in learning activities with their children.
- \*Head Start also offers Male Involvement Activities. The classroom staff and children plan activities or events to welcome male involvement in the classrooms.
- \*Program governance is supported by parents through the Policy Council. The Policy Council works with program administration to develop and approve program policies, prepare and approve the grant application, help develop and set program short and long term goals, the hiring and termination process and help make decisions about how the Head Start program will be run. One parent is elected from each of the 5 centers to sit on the Policy Council. This is a 1 year term with a 5 year maximum lifetime participation limit.
